I assume nearly everyone here today has read *The Importance of Being Earnest* before, at least in high school (perhaps a long or short time ago) if nowhere else. 117 years after Wilde originally wrote "Earnest", we will still read it, produce it, and talk about it. Is it because Wilde crafted an incredibly rich plot? Probably not. Because it carries a deep, complex message that shook the public? Unlikely.

My guess: It's smart.

In my opinion, Wilde does nothing well as a playwright if not exciting an audience with impossibly sharp wit. It's dry and sparring, but it's engaging. And charming. Wilde had very definite opinions on society, aristocracy, and courtship – and he holds nothing back. What results is a humorous play – trivial play of serious people.

But I'll let the play speak for itself.

The cast and crew have brought a lot of focus, excitement, and fun to our very short rehearsal process (Three weeks!). This collection of people have shared a belief that the fun of performance and bringing these characters to life originates in dedicated, focused effort in (and outside) rehearsal.
